EVENTS IN FEBRUARY IN INDIA AND WORLD



Freestyle Chess G.O.A.T Challenge

The freestyle chess G.O.A.T challenge was an OTB Chess960 tournament held in Wangles, Germany February 9th to 16th. The 8 player tournament was single round robin rapid followed by knockout classical all in Chess960 variant. The event featured some of the biggest names in chess including former world champion GM Magnus Carlsen and current champion GM Ding Liren. The tournament was won by GM Magnus Carlsen from Norway who defeated American Fabiano Caruana in the finals.

Prague Chess Festival

The 10 player round robin classical tournament is being held from February 27th to March 7th in Prague, Czech Republic. The tournament is featuring many top players including Candidate Vidit Gujrathi and Candidate R. Praggnanandha.

12th National School Open Chess Championship

The 12th edition of National Schools Chess Championship was held from 6th to 10th February 2024. A total of 913 children registered in six different age groups - Under-7, 9, 11, 13, 15 and 17. The tournament was organized by All Bihar Chess Association in association with Bihar State Sports Authority at Gyan Bhavan in Patna, Bihar.

Olympiad moves to Hungary

In a symbolic gesture, the Chess Olympiad torch was handed off by India to the 2024 host Hungary at the National Stadium, New Delhi on February 14, 2024. In the presence of the five-time World champion Vishy Anand and Hungary's Judit Polgar, besides officials from several embassies, Union Sports Minister Anurag Thakur lit the torch and passed on the flame to FIDE President Arkady Dvorkovich to light his torch. The tournament is scheduled in the month of September, 2024.

TRENDING IN IITM BS CHESS COMMUNITY

ALL WOMEN'S TOURNAMENT

The 1st ever all women's chess tournament of IITM BS chess community was held on February 18, 2024. The event was organized on Lichess in a 3+0 arena format. Some of the best female chess players of IITM BS competed for the top spot. The tournament was won by **Shreetu Nandi** (Lichess rating- 1825) who scored 14 points with 7 wins.

HOUSE BILATERAL TOURNAMENTS



Following intense negotiations the chess community of IITM-BS was able to arrange bilateral tournaments between multiple houses in the month of February. While Gir house and Nallamala house competed in the battle of lions on February 27th, the Bisons of Nilgiri house challenged the tigers of Kanha house on February 28th. The tournaments were held in two stages i.e., team selection stage followed by Main event. **Gir house** and **Kanha house** won the respective tournaments.

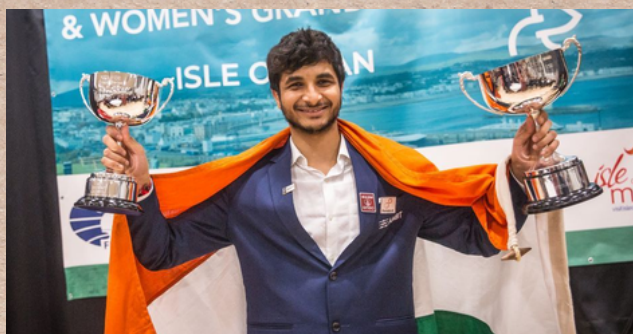
ASHWATH KAUSHIK, THE 8-YR OLD PRODIGY

On 18th of February 2024, the world of chess was shocked yet once again by an Indian. 8-yr old Ashwath Kaushik, who has been living in Singapore since the last 6 years, became the youngest ever player to defeat a grandmaster in classical chess. Kaushik, who is rated just 1892, beat Poland's GM Jacek Stopa (2351). The youngster has previously won a triple gold at the Eastern Asian Youth Championships and is a former World U-8 Rapid Champion. Ashwath dreams of becoming the World Champion one day and states that he won't stop playing until he fulfills this dream.

While most of us were collecting our favorite superhero cards when we were Ashwath's age, this prodigy is busy collecting achievements paving his own pathway to success. While he has already come a long way at such a young age, Ashwath still has a long way to go. It will definitely be interesting to follow the wunderkind's journey in the years to come.

WOMEN - CHESS PLAYERS, NOT JUST WOMEN CHESS PLAYERS

Following the Tata Steel Masters chess tournament held in Wijk Aan Zee, the Netherlands, 18-year-old International Master Divya Deshmukh, through an Instagram post, spoke out against sexism in chess, discussing the disrespect women chess players receive from the audience.

Having scored a respectable 4.5 points, with 3 brilliant wins in the tournament, the player was disheartened to discover that she was being judged by the audience based on unrelated factors. She also stated that her male counterparts received much less personal judgement from the audience.

"With an increase in online tournaments and with games being livestreamed, women players have become disproportionately vulnerable to receiving misogynistic comments from the predominantly male audience online,"



says sports writer Susan Ninan, and further argues that such trolling reinforces sexist ideas toward chess and can undermine young female players' confidence.

Though comments from audience online, even for male players, usually tend to be related to unrelated aspects of their personality their height, voice, or mannerisms; but such remarks are more prevalent for female players, and have greater emphasis on their appearance, attractiveness, or likeability.

The post has spurred debates online that only give further substance to her argument. When all talks about making the sport more inclusive for women devolve into debates about whether women are intrinsically worse at chess, one begins to question, are some animals more equal than others?

The legendary Kasparov vs Deep Blue series of matches kicked off on February 10, 1996. This game marked a turning point in chess history as this was the first time a reigning world champion ever lost against a computer with tournament conditions and slow time controls.
